And now, a word about Innsmouth: "During the winter of 1927-28 officials of the Federal government made a strange and secret investigation of certain conditions in the ancient Massachusetts seaport of Innsmouth...There were vague statements about disease and concentration camps, and later about dispersal in various naval and military prisons, but nothing positive ever developed. But I must try to tell what I thought I saw that night--a legion of croaking, baying entities of unknown source flopped noisomely past, scarcely more than a hundred yards away."--The Shadow Over Innsmouth.
